STRUCTURING AND WRITING A LITERATURE REVIEW

A suggested structure

This is a suggested structure only. If your tutor gives you a different structure, you must follow it.

INTRODUCTION

- Start with an introductory sentence which introduces the key subject area and the aims of the literature review
- Describe in more detail, the key subject area covered in the literature review
- Say which related subject areas are <u>not</u> covered in the review

MAIN BODY (middle section)

- Structure the work into sections
 - group different topics into broad themes
 - put topics in order which links them together; for example by related ideas or chronology (sequence of publication or events)
- Arrange each section in the same way; for example
 - start with a general description or definition of the topic
 - discuss and critically evaluate the literature
 - talk about how the literature relates to the main subject area of the literature review
- Direct the reader when there is crossover of material; for example:
 - "as discussed in the previous section"
 - "which will be discussed in detail in section 2.1"

CONCLUSION

- Briefly summarise the main points of your middle section, relating them to the key subject area of the literature review
- Bring everything together in your conclusion, and match it with the introduction
